### about 'The Tute'



Plans are going ahead for the lease of the Langley Park Institute to be transferred from the Community Association to the Parish Council. After discussions (Coal Industry Social Welfare CISWO Organisation) it was agreed that this would take place and allow the Parish Council to go ahead and secure the building prior to putting together an action plan for its development for benefit of the community. County Cllrs Joe Armstrong Campbell and Malcolm have committed funding to allow the building to be made secure and watertight while a steering group and action plan is put together.

The need for development was recognised by a partnership of agencies, the Parish Council and local County Councillor Joe Armstrong in a Needs Survey carried out in 2009—a copy is available at the Harry Guildford Centre.


Local Authorities, Parish and Town Councils were to be banned publishing their own weekly/monthly newsletters which are, apparently, threatening to put local newspapers out of business! However the NALC has won a victory with the Department of Communities and Local Government over its guidelines for the code of publicity and lobbying. Local (parish and town) councils will be allowed to publish its newsletters magazines once a month, while other tiers of local government will be restricted to publishing its magazines or newsletters on a quarterly basis.

The revised code includes rules such as -

- Advertising should be balanced, factually accurate and not likely to be perceived by the public as a political statement or a commentary on contentious areas of public policy.
- Councils should not publish news papers in direct competition to local press.

So the Journal, Northern Echo and Durham Times can now breathe easy as we are no longer able to be in direct competition to them!!!





#### **NHS Health Trainer Service**

Health trainers work with a broad range of people and can provide you with a structured one to one session to support and motivate you in managing your condition, taking into account personal circumstances, barriers and motivations. As part of your support you will be provided with details of all the local activities and support groups in your local area to help you feel more supported with your condition. The Health Trainer service will put you into touch with local people who can help you work towards a healthier lifestyle.

They can help in three ways:

- Help you to improve your diet
- Help you to stop smoking
- Help you to become more physically active

Your health trainer will help you to set and achieve your goals through helping you with your motivation, taking control and living with your condition and developing a plan of action tailored to your needs.

## Its not all ' and Jerusalem!'

Ask people what they know about the Women's Institute these days and they probably mention 'Calendar Girls', or jam and 'Jerusalem', but there's much more to us than that.

It all began in Stoney Creek, Canada in 1897. The first British WI was founded in 1915 in the Welsh village of Llanfairpwllgwynrigyllgogerychwyrndrobwilllantysiliogogogoch (honest!!) Its aims were twofold. To revitalise rural communities and to encourage women to become more involved in producing food during World War1.

The spirit of these aims still applies today. We help members develop new skills (and yes this sometimes means how to make the best jam!) but we are also involved in campaigns both at home and abroad that affect women and children.

With over 205,000 members the WI is frequently consulted by Governments, and was influential in the introduction of equal pay in 1942, breast cancer screening in 1975, Aids awareness in 1986 and EU legislation in 2006 to reduce hazardous chemicals in everyday products. On going campaigns are concerned with violence against women, climate change and working with OXFAM to improve maternal healthcare in other countries.

Besides the 'global influence' the WI is alive and well in our parish area. There are three local groups. At each monthly meeting after the traditional singing of 'Jerusalem' we are given interesting and inspirational talks and demonstrations. We raise money for local charities, and make cultural visits (How could we not go to see Calendar Girls!) We dine out together occasionally and whatever we do is done with lots of fun and laughter.
